

SOCIOLOGICAL NORMS MORES FOLKWAYS

Folkways and mores are informal norms that dictate behavior; however, the violation of mores carries heavier consequences.

Mores are norms of morality, or right and wrong, and if you break one it is often considered offensive to most people of a culture. Signs can consist of sounds, gestures, letters, or symbols, depending on whether the language is spoken, signed, or written. Norms may be further classified as either mores or folkways. Think about a time when a parent, guardian, coach, employer, or teacher agents of social control used informal social control to respond to your behavior. Social norms are neither static nor universal; they change with respect to time and vary with respect to culture, social classes, and social groups. A symbol is any object, typically material, which is meant to represent another usually abstract object, even if there is no meaningful relationship. Those who enforce laws have been given legal right by a government to control behavior for the good of society at large. This may include elaborate dances and other movements. Various theories assume that language fundamentally shapes our perception. The nature and the degree of the taboo are in the mores. The structuralist view of language sees language as a formal system of signs governed by grammatical rules of combination to communicate meaning. Formal norms are established, written rules. A simple nod of the head is enough. They define the expected or acceptable behavior in particular circumstances. What did the agent of informal social control do? Sanctions can either be positive rewards or negative punishment, and can arise from either formal or informal control. They might punish her behavior by scolding her, threatening judgment in the afterlife, or shunning her from their homes and the church. Lastly, and most important to the study of crime and criminal justice, our laws. Sumner coined the term mores to refer to norms that are widely observed and have great moral significance. Social norms are the explicit or implicit rules specifying acceptable behaviors within a society or group. Folkways mark the distinction between rude and polite behavior, so they exert a form of social pressure that encourages us to act and interact in certain ways. Additionally, one may get excluded from the group or society. The idealist view holds that the human mental capacities are generally unrestricted by their biological-material basis. This principle holds that the structure of a language affects the ways in which its speakers conceptualize his or her world worldview or otherwise influences their cognitive processes. Many folkways are actions we take for granted. We learn norms in a variety of settings and from various people, including our family, our teachers and peers at school, and members of the media.
